Employment estimates in this report are generated by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS). Monthly employment estimates are subject to revision in subsequent months when more sample data become available. BLS data in this report are rounded to the nearest 100. On a seasonally adjusted basis, preliminary estimates from the federal Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) indicate nonfarm employment in Washington rose by 11,900 in June 2023.1 BLS estimates the private sector gained 8,800 jobs during the month and the public sector added 3,100 jobs.

On a not seasonally adjusted basis, estimates for June 2022 through June 2023 indicate an increase in employment of 117,900 for the state. The private sector gained 92,300 jobs while the public sector gained an estimated 25,600 jobs over the year.

Washington's preliminary seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for June 2023 is 3.8 percent. The revised estimated June 2023 unemployment rate is at 4.1 percent. The June 2022 unemployment rate was 3.9 percent.

BLS estimates of monthly job gains and losses are based on a survey of businesses. Preliminary estimates are subject to revision. The May 2023 preliminary estimated gain of 2,900 jobs was revised to a gain of 4,700 jobs.

Resident civilian labor force and unemployment, seasonally adjusted

The resident civilian labor force is the total number of people in the workforce, employed and unemployed, ages 16 and up.

The number of unemployed is the estimated number of people who currently do not have a job, are available for work and have actively looked for work in the last four weeks.

The unemployment rate is the ratio of the estimated number of unemployed divided by the civilian labor force.

¹Most of the employment numbers discussed in this report refers to jobs, not people. For example, if a person holds two positions, these positions are counted as two jobs in the employment series. In the section titled "Unemployment," these positions refer to individuals, not jobs. In this case, a person holding two jobs is counted only once.

Unemployment, seasonally adjusted

The BLS estimates Washington's preliminary seasonally adjusted unemployment rate for June 2023 is 3.8 percent. The revised estimated May 2023 unemployment rate is 4.1 percent.

According to BLS estimates, the number of unemployed people fell by 10,500 in June 2023 compared to May 2023. At the same time, the number of employed people rose by an estimated 13,400. Overall, this amounted to an increase of 2,900 people in the labor force.

The preliminary June 2023 unemployment rate is 0.1 percentage points lower than the June 2022 rate of 3.9 percent.



Unemployment rates, seasonally adjusted


U.S., Washington and Seattle, June 2019 through June 2023







U-6: Broader annual average unemployment measure decreased in the fourquarter period through first quarter 2023

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) recently updated its "alternative measures of labor underutilization" for states to include four-quarter rates through first quarter 2023. One such alternative measure is the U-6 rate, which considers not only the unemployed population in the official "U-3" unemployment rate, but also marginally attached workers and those employed part time for economic

reasons. The U-6 rate is defined by BLS as the "total unemployed, plus all marginally attached workers, plus total employed part time for economic reasons, as a percent of the civilian labor force plus all marginally attached workers." This U-6 measure measures the "unemployed, underemployed, and those who are not looking but who want a job." The U-6 annual average unemployment rate for the four-quarter period through first quarter 2023 for Washington state was 7.4 percent. This was lower compared to the 9.1 percent four-quarter period through first quarter 2022. The U.S. U-6 average annual unemployment rate for 2022 was 6.9 percent.

Industry employment in Washington, seasonally adjusted

One-month employment change by industry

Based on a BLS survey of businesses and governments, Washington gained an estimated 11,900 jobs during the month, on a seasonally adjusted basis:

- Overall, employment increased in seven major industries and decreased in six in June.
- Private sector employment is estimated to have increased by 8,800 and government employment increased by 3,100.
- Leisure and hospitality employment increased by 8,900 overall, with 5,200 jobs added in food services and drinking places.
- The number of jobs in education and health services increased by 4,600 overall, with 3,100 jobs gained in social assistance.
- Professional and business services employment increased by 500 overall, with 800 jobs gained in professional, scientific and technical services.
- Manufacturing employment fell by 2,500, led by 1,700 jobs lost in food manufacturing.
- Retail trade employment decreased by 2,800 overall, with 900 jobs lost by food and beverage stores.

Change by industry over the year

Based on a BLS survey of businesses and governments, Washington gained an estimated 117,900 jobs from June 2022 through June 2023.

- Overall, twelve major industries expanded and one decreased.
- Private sector employment rose 3.1 percent, up an estimated 92,300 jobs.
- Public sector employment rose 4.5 percent, up an estimated 25,600 jobs.
- Education and health services employment rose by 32,700 overall, with 24,700 jobs added in health services and social assistance.
- Employment in leisure and hospitality is up by 25,200, with food services and drinking places adding 17,200 jobs.
- Manufacturing employment increased by 10,700, with 7,000 jobs gained in aerospace product and parts manufacturing.
- Professional and business services employment increased by 8,300, with 3,200 jobs added in computer systems design and related services.
- Employment in construction is up 7,400 overall, led by an increase of 4,900 by specialty trade contractors.

Seasonally adjusted employment

Seasonally adjusted numbers account for normal seasonal patterns that occur year after year, such as strong seasonal hiring in retail trade around the holidays. Taking into account normal seasonal variations makes it possible to see unusual changes in employment levels.

Normal seasonal change is the expected monthly change in employment based on history.

Estimated change is the employment change over the month based on BLS survey data.

Seasonally adjusted change is change in employment accounting for normal seasonal patterns.

Based on historical patterns, Washington employment typically increases by 17,100 from May to June. This year the state gained an estimated 29,000 jobs, amounting to a seasonally adjusted increase of 11,900 jobs.

 The normal seasonal gain in leisure and hospitality employment is 6,800 in June. The estimated gain was 15,700, so employment increased by 8,900 on a seasonally adjusted basis. Normal seasonal change, estimated change and seasonally adjusted change Washington state, June 2023

- The estimated employment increase in construction was 5,500. The normal seasonal increase is 3,800, so on a seasonally adjusted basis, construction employment increased by 1,700.
- Typically, manufacturing employment increases by 3,300 in June. On a seasonally adjusted basis, manufacturing employment decreased by 2,500 as the estimated increase was 800.
- The employment increase on a seasonally adjusted basis was 500 in professional and business services in June. The normal seasonal increase is 3,100. It is estimated to have increased this June by 3,600.
- Employment in retail trade normally increases by 2,000. It is estimated to have decreased by 800 this June so it decreased by 2,800 on a seasonally adjusted basis.

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
